



Exploring Autumn

Acorn Class - Autumn 1 (2 weeks)

Overview

We have nearly completed our first term at school! Over the next few weeks, we will be continuing to support your child with understanding our 3 school rules: Be Ready, Be Respectful, Be Safe. We will also focus on developing their understanding of what each of our PRIDE values mean: What is a POSITIVE Panda, RESPECTFUL Rhino, INDIVIDUAL Iquana, DETERMINED Dingo or an EXCELLENT Elephant?

During our 'Exploring Autumn' project, your child will go on a woodland walk to learn about the seasonal changes that happen in Autumn. They will learn about birds and animals that live in the woods and how they survive as the weather

gets colder. They will take part in practical and creative activities that will support them to learn about Autumn. They will also become very familiar with the texts, 'Leaf Man' by Lois Ehlert and 'Pumpkin Soup' by Helen Cooper.



Vocabulary

Acorns, Autumn, badger, blackberries, conkers, fox, harvest, hedgehog, hibernate, leaves, pine cones, pumpkins, season, spider, squirrel, wild animal, woodland

Memorable Experiences

We will start our project by going on an Autumn walk around the school grounds, where we will collect natural objects which we will use creatively in our classroom.

We will be learning Autumn poems and a harvest song and will perform these to our parents during our 'Stay and Play' session on **WEDNESDAY 19th OCTOBER** (9am – 10:30am).

PRIME AREAS

Communication and Language

- Understand how to listen carefully and why listening is important
- Learn new vocabulary
- Use new vocabulary through the day
- Articulate their ideas and thoughts in well-formed sentences
- Describe events in some detail
- Engage in story times
- Listen to and talk about stories to build familiarity and understanding
- Listen carefully to rhymes and songs, paying attention to how they sound

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

- See themselves as a valuable individual
- Build constructive and respectful relationships
- Express their feelings and consider the feelings of others
- Manage their own personal hygiene
- Talk with others to solve conflicts
- Remember rules without needing an adult to remind them

Gross Motor Skills

- Revise and refine the fundamental movement skills they have already acquired (walking, jumping, running, hopping, climbing)
- Progress towards a more fluent style of moving, with developing control and grace

Fine Motor Skills

 Develop their small motor skills so that they can use a range of tools competently, safely and confidently (paintbrushes, scissors, knives/forks/spoons)

We start each day with fine motor activities – this develops your child's hand muscle strength, which will support them to be confident writers! Our fine motor activities this term will involve using natural materials such as leaves, conkers, acorns and pumpkins/squashes.
